Message from Alan Foster



One year on - thank you

I am sure like me you were moved by all the messages of support and media coverage marking the fact that it is now one year on from when the first COVID-19 patients were cared for at Newcastle's High Consequence Infectious Diseases Unit.

As I mentioned in last week's bulletin it has been a year of great sadness but also one where we have pulled together to do the very best for our communities. I would like to reiterate my thanks and pay tribute to all our health and care teams, and other key

workers, for all they have done and continue to do, to keep us all safe.

The latest picture across the region

The picture is slowly improving across the region and we are seeing a reduction in the number of patients with COVID-19 being admitted to our hospitals, but only a very small reduction in those needing critical care. Currently there's around 1,300 COVID-19 patients in our hospitals across the region and that had been sitting at around 1,500 for a number of weeks so this is an improvement. Things are going in the right direction and we are also seeing a continued decline in the number of community cases too, which is reassuring. That said, this has been unrelenting for staff and supporting them in the weeks and months ahead remains so important.

500,000 vaccines delivered across our region

Absolutely outstanding achievement across our region that we have now delivered over 500,000 COVID vaccines. I could not be prouder, and I am sure you feel the same too. The latest figures up to the 31st January have been released today and can be found here.

And there's more good news on this front for our region this week – that the Novavax vaccine will be manufactured in Billingham in Stockton on Tees once it receives approval. We have also been closely involved in the clinical trials for this vaccine and you can read more here.

There was positive coverage in the <u>Guardian</u> this week on the efforts underway in our region, specifically by Newcastle GP Federation which you might be interested in reading. Just one example of the herculean efforts underway.

Push to vaccinate hard to reach staff groups

We need a really big push to ensure we vaccinate all frontline health and social care workers by the end of this month - especially those that are hard to reach. Most staff will be vaccinated by their host employer but please remember we have developed an online platform for those staff where this is not the case or for those who are more difficult to reach, such as those who work across borders.

You can read more about it in a <u>letter</u> and <u>leaflet</u> from the Strategic Vaccination Operating Centre (SVOC). This makes clear that if an employer is already arranging an appointment staff should not register again, as it will not be quicker and will take away valuable appointments for other staff. Please do all you can to reach out to these groups of staff and encourage them to be vaccinated.

Captain Sir Tom Moore

This week we are all incredibly saddened to hear of the passing of Captain Sir Tom Moore. He was a true inspiration to us all and won a place in all our hearts (and in our

NHS family) after raising almost £33 million for NHS charities.

We are already seeing the benefits of his legacy across our region with this money being used to improve care and facilities for our patients and staff. Our thoughts are with his family and friends at this time, and all those who have lost loved ones during these difficult times.

Learning Disability Network launches new website

Happy birthday to our North East and Cumbria Learning Disability Network which has launched its new website on its 10th anniversary, please do check it out. The R number in the UK: The latest reproduction number (R) and growth rate of coronavirus (COVID-19) in the UK can be found here on <u>GOV.UK</u>.
